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2018 WSCFF Legislative Conference Now the Real Work Begins

The Kelly L. Fox Legislative Conference was held on Tuesday, January 9, 2018, at the Hotel RL in Olympia. President Dennis Lawson, Vice President Mike Bacon and Secretary/Treasurer Greg Markley welcomed 215 representatives from 69 locals statewide as they joined together in Olympia to learn about and help forward the legislative agenda of the WSCFF.

Tuesday evening, the WSCFF hosted a legislative reception for members of the legislature, staff, and friends. This event, which was very well attended by elected officials, provides our members an opportunity to meet face to face with their legislators in a social setting and discuss issues in greater detail than the time allotted during their office visits earlier in the day.

This year we are proud to announce Firefighter/EMT AJ Johnson, from Local 1828 Snohomish, as the candidate selected for the newly created 2018 Legislative Liaison Intern position. AJ has the desire and willingness to learn the legislative process and brings a considerable amount of knowledge with him. Due to the ever-increasing need to find members who can assist with the critical work that takes place in Olympia, we are excited to have AJ developing the skillset to assist with our legislative agenda. Legislative Liaisons Michael White and Geoff Simpson are doing an outstanding job, and we are thrilled to have AJ learning from them.

There are three main priorities of the WSCFF this legislative session:

1. Establishing additional presumptive disease coverage that recognizes new, peer-reviewed evidence demonstrating firefighters are at greater risk of contracting nine different cancers.

For example, women in the fire service have a 5.24 times greater risk of cervical cancer compared to women who are not firefighters. (For the complete list, please see the WSCFF website.) Additionally, the WSCFF supports clarifying that both the cardiac-illness-related form of stroke and methicillin resistant staphylococcus aureus (MRSA) are considered presumptive diseases.

2. Funding Local Public Safety Enhancement Account LEOFF Plan 2 as proposed in the 2018-2019 budget by Governor Jay Inslee. Legislators recognized the shortcomings of the LEOFF 2 Pension Plan, including its inability to produce an adequate pension at a member's normal retirement age of 53 and today's legislature must honor their contract.

They created the fund to save for necessary improvements to LEOFF 2. They also recognized that a future legislature might be tempted NOT to make payments, so they made payments mandatory. The WSCFF is requesting \$25 million in funding towards the required deposit into the Local Public Safety Enhancement Account. The Governor has included a \$25 million appropriation in his 2018-2019 proposed budget.

3. Adding PTSD to the list of occupationally related diseases in first responders. The WSCFF supports worker compensation coverage for PTSD. Presumptive laws allow treatment for firefighters and EMS workers to return to work and helps raise awareness about the disease and destigmatize the condition for those seeking treatment for their illness. It is clear from research that firefighters are at an increased risk for PTSD. By removing barriers to care and acknowledging the link between firefighting and PTSD, these laws

In other words, we all need to be reminded more than we need to be instructed.

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



Have you ever noticed that some people say workers are "forced" to pay union dues?

"Without the union it becomes "the right to work for less state".

But those same people don't say a thing about being "forced" to take the pay, benefits, and protections that come with a union contract.



"My late husband was a union lineman. He paid dues every month willingly for many years. The union made sure he was able to work in any state he chose. They made sure that the gear supplied by the companies he worked for were safe. When he passed away, the union paid death benefits to me as a survivor and I also receive a pension check every month and will continue to do so for the rest of my life. Had he been non-union there

would be NO benefits for survivors to depend on. "

"You only choose to pay union dues if you choose to work union jobs. Don't want to pay dues? Don't work with the union. You'll be kicking yourself later .'

"Some people constantly strive to prove just how foolish they really are. I paid union dues to the Carpenter's union for many years, it was a very small amount when compared to my wage rate, now I am retired and I no longer pay union dues. Every month the union sends me a pay check and I am able to do what I want to do in retirement. How can anyone bad mouth that unless they are completely out of touch. "
