WSCFF Legislative Summary

Sine Die - Sort of

The 2017 Regular Session concluded on Sunday, April 23, with the Legislature adjourning – Sine Die. This term "sine die" is a Latin term meaning "without fixing a day for future action or appointing a day to reconvene." With the legislature failing to approve an agreed-to operating budget, the Governor will call lawmakers back into "special session," also referred to as an "extraordinary session," which can last up to 30 days. Despite the name, it is neither extraordinary nor special for lawmakers to require additional time to complete the budget. The first extraordinary session came in 1890, a year after statehood. Since 2010, the Legislature has gone into special session every year except 2014. The legislature required two special sessions in 2010, 2011 and 2012.

Three special sessions were needed in 2013

and 2015.

The Governor convened the special session March 29, and most lawmakers will return home while budget writers and caucus leaders stay to work on the budget. We anticipate little to no legislative activity until negotiators reach a

legislative activity until a budget compromise.

Your WSCFF Legislative Liaisons Michael White from Local 1352 Valley Regional Fire and Geoff Simpson from Local 1747 Kent have been working overtime all session. Because of their tremendous work, the following five bills are now headed to the Governor's desk: WSCFF HB 1358 Treat & Refer; 1467 Removing Disincentives; 1863, Incident Reporting Funding; 2202, EMT's into LEOFF; and 5628, City Fire Districts.

With the exception of HB 1467 and SB 5628, these bills all require spending authorization in the operating budget. We believe we will be successful in making that happen, but we cannot be certain until the final gavel drops. Stay tuned!

2017 IAFF/WSCFF Educational Seminar

This year's Educational Seminar was held April 24-27, 2017, at The Davenport Hotel, a beautiful, historic hotel located in the heart of downtown Spokane. Over 300 WSCFF members from 90 locals attended this event, which provides practical training and allows members from all over Washington the opportunity to gain insight and support from each other and to get together on a social level.

We were honored to have keynote speaker Melissa Luck, Assistant News Director from KXLY News. She highlighted the power of using the current trend of social media. For example, just by sharing pictures and personal stories, locals can build loyalty and support for a levy that is cropping up. Classes were offered at three levels and included topics such as retirement checklists, PTSD and presumptive illness resources, duties and responsibilities in leadership for the fire service, how to run a union meeting, and an eye-opening seminar by Norm Golden. Norm is both a firefighter with Local 1352 and a criminal defense attorney in Seattle. "Smokin, Drinkin Fightin" was a fitting title, as he entertained while highlighting legal issues that can help or hurt WSCFF fire firefighters.

Your department's social media may be just the transparency you need in order to allow the public to see their tax dollars in action, building trust and ensuring the community that their money is not being wasted. By spending just a short amount of time, your local can make a profound impact on your relationship with the public, increasing visibility and quickly disseminating important information.


With 39,000 More Members, Washington State is Now 5th Most Unionized in U.S

An estimated 539,000 Washington State residents belonged to labor unions in 2016, a new report from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics shows an increase of 39,000 from the previous year. Although union membership levels dropped nationally as Republican state lawmakers passed more union-busting "right-to-work" laws, union membership rose in many free-bargaining states like Washington, where the union membership level increased from to 16.8 percent in 2015 to 17.4 percent last year.

"Union growth in Washington State is good for everyone," said Jeff Johnson, President of the Washington State Labor Council, AFL-CIO. "Union members earn more, spend more in their communities, and lift working standards for all of us. Polls and surveys show that people want to join unions. These numbers demonstrate that, unless they are hindered by outdated or hostile labor laws, people will stand together and form unions."

Union members earn higher wages, with average weekly earnings of \$1,004 compared to \$802 for nonunion. With union wages averaging 25 percent higher than nonunion wages, full-time union members make more than \$52,000 per year on average, which is \$10,500 more than nonunion workers.
